

School Profile – Sample A

This resource is part of Making Caring Common's School Profile Project, an initiative aimed at providing school counselors with tools for effective and equitable college admission practices. The 'School Profile Sample: School A' provides school counselors with an example of a completed, two-page school profile.

This school profile sample assumes the identity and location of a fictional 'East High School' in Old Town, Massachusetts. However, the demographic details, academic profile, and extracurricular offerings were intentionally selected to reflect the offerings and experiences of many schools around the country.

This sample consolidates the 14 critical components of a school profile, as identified by Dr. Tara Nicola.* While we encourage all counselors to customize their profile in a manner that reflects their school's programs and values, we hope that this document lifts up how a school can represent the most salient parts of its student experience in a realistic and feasible two-page format.

East High School, located in Old Town, is the district's largest public school and serves 1,200 students in grades 9-12. Old Town boasts a diverse immigrant community. We are in proximity to many manufacturing plants and many of our families are employed at these sites. It's not uncommon for our students to play significant roles at home including translating for parents, working part-time jobs, and caring for siblings. East High provides a robust academic experience so that our students are prepared to pursue rigorous college degree programs and/or enter the workforce.

Programs & Courses Offered

AP Courses: We offer a select number of AP courses. Students are eligible to take AP classes during their junior and senior year.

United States History, American Government, Biology, Economics, Environmental Science

Honors Program: All students are eligible to take honors courses throughout their four years. Geometry, Algebra 2, Pre-Calculus, Spanish, French, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, English II, English IV, World History, US History.

Extra-Curricular Offerings

Athletics

- We offer 15 men's and women's sports at the Varsity and Junior Varsity level.
- 45% of our students participate in athletics.
- Last year, East High's baseball team won the conference title and competed in the regional tournament.

Fine and Performing Arts

- Students have the option to participate in drama, dance, and music through elective course offerings or through extracurricular programming.
- The drama and dance departments put on multiple productions each year, open to all students.
- Our music department includes choir, band, and orchestra at the beginning, intermediate, and advanced level. Our jazz ensemble is audition-based and regularly places in regional competitions.

Clubs & Student Organizations

- East High offers more than 30 student-run organizations.
- These encompass student leadership organizations (Student Council, Student-Athlete Leadership Council), academic clubs (policy debate, Model UN, National Honor Society), identity and affinity clubs (Black Student Union, Gay-Straight Alliance, La Raza Coalition), and service organizations (Best Buddies, UNICEF, Students Demand Action).
