

School Profile – Sample B

This resource is part of Making Caring Common's School Profile Project, an initiative aimed at providing school counselors with tools for effective and equitable college admission practices. You can find additional school profile materials here, including templates, examples, best practices, and insights from school counselors. The 'School Profile Sample: School B' provides school counselors with an example of a completed, three-page school profile.

This school profile sample assumes the identity and location of a fictional 'Central High School' in Brookside, California. However, the demographic details, academic profile, and extracurricular offerings were intentionally selected to reflect the offerings and experiences of many schools around the country. While 'School Profile Sample: School B' generally follows our School Profile Template, it offers a glimpse of how schools with numerous academic tracks or special programs may expand upon the parameters of the template to capture the full dimensions of their community.

This sample consolidates the 14 critical components of a school profile, as identified by Dr. Tara Nicola.* While we encourage all counselors to customize their profile in a manner that reflects their school's programs and values, we hope that this document lifts up how a school can represent the most salient parts of its student experience in a realistic and feasible three-page format.

Central High School 2024-2025 School Profile

School Context

Central High School, Brookside's largest public school, serves 2,000 students in grade 9-12. Central High offers a range of academic programs to meet the needs of our diverse learning community, including an AP and IB diploma curriculum and a performing & visual arts concentration.

Central is located in an urban area and most students walk or take public transit to campus. It's not uncommon for students to arrive as early as 7am and stay until 7pm for extracurriculars. Many of our parents are faculty members, staff, or researchers at our regional state university. As such, our students often feel heightened family expectations to succeed in and out of the classroom.

While we do offer accelerated academic tracks, our teachers and counselors work to maintain a collaborative environment where students can explore their full range of interests. As part of our commitment to developing the whole student, all students are expected to complete 50 volunteer service hours with a community organization of their choice.

IB Diploma Program

Our most rigorous course sequence, students apply their sophomore year into our IB program. 20% of juniors and seniors will take a full IB curriculum. In 2023, 197 seniors took IB exams in 12 subjects, earning a mean IB score of 28 points. Of our IB diploma recipients, eight students earned the Bilingual International Baccalaureate Diploma in French.

AP Curriculum

All students are eligible to take honors or AP classes during their four years. 40% of seniors will have taken at least one AP course prior to graduation. In 2021, 700 students took 1,350 AP exams, earning a mean score of 3.25. 78 students received AP Scholar recognition.

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Scheduling a Visit

Central High welcomes admission officers to visit the counseling office during lunch hours from Sept. 5th through November 1st.

Performing/Visual Arts

Students have the opportunity to audition into an arts concentration in either band, orchestra, chorus, or visual arts. Beyond taking arts elective courses for all four years, arts concentrators are expected to participate in our senior art showcase, take at least one accelerated academic course in the arts (i.e. AP Music theory, AP Art History, AP Studio Art, etc.), and represent Central High School in regional performances and competitions.

Additional Graduation Requirements

- Each IB Diploma student must take the entire curriculum, sit for all required exams (both Higher Level and Standard Level), submit an Extended Essay in one of the subjects of the IB curriculum, and complete coursework in Theory of Knowledge.
- All Advanced Placement (AP) courses include the appropriate College Board examinations.
- All students are expected to complete 50 community service hours prior to graduation.

- The drama club puts on multiple productions each year, open to all students.
- Our music department includes choir, band, and orchestra at the beginning, intermediate, and advanced level. Our advanced ensembles are audition-based and regularly place in regional competitions.

Clubs & Student Organizations

- Central High offers **more than 30** student-run organizations.
- These encompass student leadership organizations (Student Council, Student-Athlete Leadership Council), academic clubs (policy debate, Model UN, National Honor Society), identity and affinity clubs (Black Student Union, Gay-Straight Alliance, La Raza Coalition), and service and action organizations (Best Buddies, UNICEF, Students Demand Action).
